Exit Slip Examples

Exit slips are an active learning strategy that requires students to put information into their own words, so they can internalize the content, identify gaps in their understanding, or alert the instructor to potential problems. This strategy is particularly useful at the end of a lecture or class session as a formative assessment to gauge how well students are learning course topics before students complete a summative assessment, like a project, presentation, essay, or exam, so you can intervene before it's too late.
